Presented by KU Student Speech-Language-Hearing Association (KUSSHA) at The University Of Kansas' Department of Speech-Language-Hearing: Sciences and Disorders. The Kansas Speech-Language-Hearing Association (KSHA) is co-sponsoring this program.

Auditory Neuropathy Spectrum Disorder (ANSD), although rare, is a complex disorder. It has a significant impact on quality of life, education and the development of speech and language. It requires a multidisciplinary approach to diagnosis as well as to provide intervention and management. Providers need more information on the subject and strategies to use when they have kids with this diagnosis on their caseload.

Angie Reeder, Ph.D., CCC-A

Angie Reeder is the audiologist for the Schiefelbusch Speech-Language-Hearing Clinic on the University of Kansas campus. She has worked at Children's Mercy Hospitals and Clinics as a pediatric audiologist.

Angie Reeder will present the opening and closing sessions and will provide an in depth overview of ANSD, its causes, subgroups, and diagnosis process.

Opening session will run from approximately 9:00-10:30.

Closing session will run from approximately 3:00- 4:00.

Panel 1 (approximately 10:45-12:15)

Panel 1 will discuss a variety of case histories across the different clinical profiles. Topics will include strategies used in intervention, the importance of tailoring these strategies to each individual child, challenges presented, and working with the family to understand ANSD.

Kay Smith, M.S., CCC- SLP

Kay Smith is a speech-language pathologist who specializes in hearing loss. She is the director of The Hartley Family Center for Childhood Hearing at the University of Kansas Medical Center

Kathy Halpin, MA, CCC-SLP

Kathy Halpin is a speech-language pathologist who specializes in Deaf/Hard of Hearing children. She works at the Hartley Family Center for Childhood Hearing at the University of Kansas Medical Center. She is also affiliated with Infant-Toddler Services of Johnson County.

Erin Schuweiler, MS, Ed.

Erin Schuweiler is a deaf educator who works for the Hartley Family Center for Childhood Hearing at the University of Kansas Medical Center. She is the Birth to Three Coordinator at the Kansas State School for the Deaf (KSD).

Panel 2 (approximately 1:15-2:45)

Panel 2 will present a case study of one child with ANSD. Topics will include the child's newborn hearing screen, his ABR, hearing aid fitting and follow-up, cochlear implant consultation, speech therapy program, and his transition into public school. Individual roles of each professional will be highlighted as well as the importance of a multi-disciplinary approach.
